Ready for a Reading Adventure?

Trying something new can be exciting—and reading is no different! Encouraging children to explore new genres and styles helps spark curiosity, build confidence, and make reading fun. Here are our top tips to help primary readers take the leap into something new.



- ✓ 1. **Start Small and Fun** Choose short, engaging texts like comics, picture books, or short stories in the new genre. This makes the change less intimidating.
- ✓ 2. **Offer Choice** Give them a selection of new genres or formats (mystery, poetry, nonfiction, graphic novels) so they feel in control.
- ✓ 3. **Connect to Interests** Link the new reading material to something they already love—sports, animals, space, or favourite hobbies.
- ✓ 4. **Model Curiosity** Show your own excitement by reading something new yourself and sharing what you enjoyed about it.
- ✓ 5. **Buddy Reading** Pair them with a friend or sibling to explore the new book together. It turns reading into a social activity.
- ✓ 6. **Use “Try It for 10” Rule** Encourage them to read just 10 pages or 10 minutes before deciding if they like it. Often, they'll want to keep going.
- ✓ 7. **Celebrate the Effort** Praise the attempt, not just the result. Acknowledge their bravery in trying something different.


