Disrupted Learning:

Missing the start of class can lead to missing crucial information, instructions, or announcements, impacting the student's ability to understand the material and stay on track with their learning.

Negative Impact on Academic Performance:

Missing class time can affect a student's overall academic performance, potentially leading to lower grades, difficulty with homework, and challenges in written assignments or projects.

Social and Emotional Impact:

Being late can also have social consequences, such as disrupting class dynamics, making the student feel embarrassed or uncomfortable, and potentially creating a sense of being behind.

Pope Francis



As I am sure you are aware, Pope Francis died on Easter Monday aged 88. He led the Catholic Church for 12 years. He was an inspirational leader who was widely admired for his humility, compassion, and dedication to social justice. He's also known for his leadership in addressing the climate crisis and his bold steps towards a more inclusive church. He consistently showed compassion for the suffering, especially the poor, migrants, and refugees, advocating for their rights and well-being.

Pope Francis has been a powerful voice for social justice, advocating for policies that promote human dignity and equality. He has championed the cause of the environment, calling for urgent action to address the climate crisis in his encyclical Laudato Si. On the 7th May, the conclave began to elect the new Pope and last night we found out Pope Leo XIV will be the New Leader of the Catholic Church.

- Y6's will help their Buddies/younger children
- We will start at the beginning of the trail and go to the end (we will not start in the middle)
- We WILL NOT use the equipment to just sit on and chat with our friends
- We will not leap off any of the equipment, or support posts onto the ground
