World Book Day 2025

For World Book Day, we explored *An Emotional Menagerie* by The School of Life—a poetic A–Z of emotions, each linked to an animal. The book helps children understand and express their feelings, from anger (a roaring lion) to calmness (a drifting jellyfish). We chose this book to support two of our REACH values: resilience and empathy. Children took part in a special assembly sharing what they had created during the day.

This year's World Book Day theme was "Read Your Way", celebrating the joy of reading wherever and however we like. Throughout the day, children were encouraged to read in their favourite way—whether that was under a table, curled up on the floor, with a friend, or even under a door! Pupils brought in their favourite books to share, along with cushions, blankets, and soft toys to make our reading sessions extra cosy and fun.




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Why not have a look this summer...

- Let Them Choose Whether it's adventure stories, comics, or fact books about dinosaurs, letting children pick what they read keeps it fun and personal.
- ➡ Create a Reading Spot A cosy corner with a cushion or blanket can make reading feel like a treat.
- □ Read Together Share stories, do the voices, laugh at silly parts—it's a great way to bond and build confidence.
- Make It a Habit A story before bed, reading in the garden, or bringing a book on a picnic—reading fits anywhere!
- ♣ Talk About Books Ask questions like "What would you do if you were that character?" or "What do you think happens next?"

 The most important thing? Keep it light, joyful, and full of imagination. Reading should be an adventure—and with your support, every child can become a book explorer!






